To celebrate National Poetry Month 2025, local poets submitted 65 haiku to the contest, judged blind by EAC Chair Alex Eyre and Ellensburg's Inaugural Poet Laureate Marie Marchand. Thirty-one haiku, written by 19 local residents, were chosen. Special thanks to Arts & Economic Development Manager Kelle Vandenberg for assisting with this contest.

In addition to this pdf book, the poets were celebrated at a launch party and reading that took place at Valo in Ellensburg on April 21, 2025, when the selected poems were read by the poets.
