
6:00 PM: After taking time to unwind, eat, and refresh myself, I get ready for my shift & get into uniform. This is when I will perform gear checks of my equipment



Shift Briefing & Car Checks

7 PM: Arrive at the PD and attend shift briefing. During shift briefing, Officers receive briefings on any significant events that occurred during the previous shift, updates on any ongoing cases/investigations, or any assignments for the day.

7:30 PM: Vehicle check. I ensure my patrol vehicle is in working order. This includes making sure all my equipment is accounted for and is functioning. This includes med kit, PBT, spike strips, 40MM, rifle (lights & laser), shield, active shooter bag, body camera, backseat is clear, body camera, and other essential tools.



Patrol Duties

Patrol duties can be done on foot, by bicycle, or in a patrol vehicle depending on the area & specific assignment

Remain proactive !

Respond to calls. Ranging from a traffic collision or a report of an in progress call. Patrols must be prepared to handle a wide range of situations

Follow up interviews / returning to a crime scenes

Cultivate informants & build relationships

Conduct proactive investigations
